### *Why a Shepherd*

Why a shepherd? Sheep are stinky and have lots of bugs, and shepherds work hard, are paid little, and need to check their sheep every day. The sheep get flies, gnats, mosquitoes, and stink. Sometimes sheep are stubborn, do not follow directions, and are not the brightest of animals. Surely God could have come up with a better example.

My oldest child gave me a book this Christmas “The Way of the Shephard – Seven secrets to managing productive people.” The only religious connection was the word “shepherd.” I read and reflected on it through the eyes of a Secular Franciscan.

Throughout the Old and New Testament, the Bible uses a shepherd to describe the relationship between Jesus with us. A shepherd knows the condition of his flock. He gets to know them one at a time and learns about their personal problems. He knows their strengths and weaknesses and what motivates them. He invests time in taking care of them and building a strong relationship with them. He is visible and checks on them every day; sometimes more than once. He loves them and they sense this love.

The sheep know their shepherd and will follow them just by the sound of his voice. Nothing assures them more than seeing their shepherd every day; they trust him with their life. If they stray from the flock the shepherd will find them. He communicates to his sheep his desires. The shepherd makes the pasture safe and counts them every day.

Sheep were domesticated 8000 years ago, and wool garments were worn in Babylon. A skilled shepherd can singly handedly move his flock of over 100 sheep to greener pastures with the use of his voice and his staff. He gets in front of the herd and gently nudges the lead sheep in the right direction, and the rest of the sheep follow. A successful shepherd leads by his staff, and his sheep do not fear him but trust his direction. If he sees the sheep heading in the wrong direction, away from the herd, he uses the other end of the staff and curves it around the sheep's neck and pulls him in the right direction in alignment with the rest of the flock. The staff

represents the shepherd responsibility to encourage his flock. Sometimes it used to stock the side of his head or pull him closer to his side.

The shepherd also has a rod. The rod is sometimes needed to protect the sheep and keep them away from harm's way. It is also used to discipline the sheep if the sheep is far away and heading for trouble. At the end of the day the rod is used to count the sheep as they enter a safe area. The shepherd uses it also to inspect the wool. If the wool is long, it is harder to detect problems with their skin.

The imagery of Jesus as a shepherd serves as a powerful reminder of His role in the lives of those that believe. It encapsulates His guidance, protection, and unconditional love, assuring followers that they are never alone and they have a caring shepherd who leads them through life. This metaphor not only highlights Jesus' divine nature but also His intimate relationship with those who follow His intimate relationship.

Jesus isn't just calling Himself a shepherd, but a good shepherd. This is extremely important. By calling Himself good, Jesus was claiming to be the promised Messiah. He says that "there is only One who is good" and that is God (Matthew 19:17; Luke 18:19).

Now when I look at the manager, I have a better understanding of the role of the shepherd.

Shepherd me, O God, beyond my wants, beyond my fears, from death into life.

## Meet Our New Regional Spiritual Assistant

### Fr. Alberto Bueno TOR

Father Alberto F. Bueno, a Third Order Regular of St. Francis, was born in 1955 in Havana, Cuba. He attended high school at Bishop Ireton High School in Alexandria; earned his bachelor's from George Mason University in Fairfax; and his master's from the University of St. Michael's College in Toronto. Fr. Bueno joined the Franciscan community in 1979, professed his first vows in 1981, and made his solemn profession in 1985. He spent internships at St. Francis Prep School and at Sacred Heart Church in Spring Grove, PA, and served his deacon internship at Holy Spirit Church in Mitchell, SD. He was ordained in 1986 by the late Bishop James Hogan of the Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown. He served in campus ministry at Franciscan University of Steubenville, OH, and in hospital chaplaincy in Fort Worth, TX. He became parochial vicar of St. Thomas Church, Fort Worth, in 1990, and after further graduate study at Washington Theological Union in Washington, DC, he served on the faculty of Conwell-Egan Catholic High School in Fairless Hills, PA. He became assistant pastor of St. Lawrence Church in Tampa, FL, in 1996, and in 1998 became chaplain of the New College of Florida, Ringling Arts and Design College, and Manatee College, all in Sarasota, FL. In 2003, Fr. Bueno returned to the Fort Worth Diocese as pastor of multiple parishes. In 2009, Fr. Bueno served as parochial vicar of St. Joseph Church in Herndon, VA. In 2020 he was assigned as parochial vicar at St. Patrick Church in Tampa, where he currently serves. He is also Spiritual Assistant for the St. Michael the Archangel fraternity in Tampa. We welcome him to our Region.

## Holy Places

Catholics pray in holy places such as churches, shrines, and sites of pilgrimage to connect with God in a special way, often through a journey or at a location of particular spiritual significance. These sacred spaces, like the Holy Land, Assisi, Italy and local shrines, are seen as places where the veil between heaven and earth feels thinner, offering a tangible link to history and the divine. While Catholics are encouraged to pray anytime and anywhere, sacred places are particularly suited for worship, prayer, and reflection.

#### ***Why pray in holy places?***

- Connect with the divine: Holy places are seen as where God's presence is more tangible, allowing for a deeper, more profound spiritual experience.
- Encounter history: Visiting sites like the Holy Land allows Catholics to walk where Jesus walked, preach, and minister, making the Gospels more real and alive.
- Experience fellowship: Pilgrimages and visits to shrines connect individuals to the communion of saints and the universal Church, both present and past.
- Seek healing and renewal: Many holy places, such as Lourdes, are associated with miraculous healings, while others offer a chance to seek spiritual or emotional renewal.
- Deepen faith through pilgrimage: The journey itself, with its inherent sacrifices and challenges, can become a powerful act of prayer, reflection, and trust in God.

#### ***Types of holy places special to Franciscans – Can you add to this list?***

- Churches: Portiuncula, San Damiano, Our Lady of the Angels
- Shrines: Shrine of St. Anthony
- Holy Land: Franciscan Friars are custodians of the Holy Land
- “Thin places”: Natural locations where the spiritual world is believed to be more accessible, such as certain mountains or rivers.
- Local holy sites: Within one's own community, individuals can find holy places to visit for prayer and reflection, such as local shrines or places with historical significance.

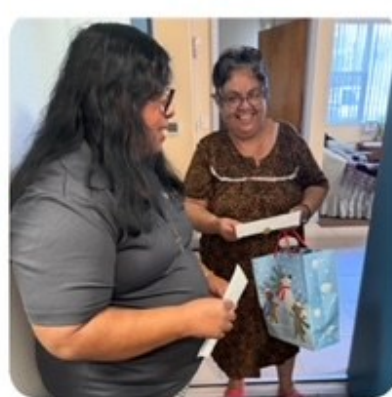
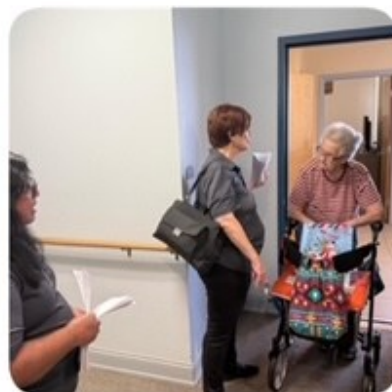
